# HAPPENINGS AT NORTHROP GRUMMAN

## Northrop Grumman Corporation (NG)

- ➤ LOS ANGELES-- The board of directors of NG declared a quarterly dividend of \$0.37 per share on Northrop Grumman common stock, payable June 9, 2007, to shareholders of record as of the close of business May 29, 2007. The board also declared a dividend of \$1.75 per share on the company's Series B convertible preferred stock, payable July 16, 2007, to shareholders of record as of the close of business July 2, 2007.
- NG has more than 14,000 employees in the South Bay area of Los Angeles. Both the Integrated Systems Sector and the Space Technology Sector have their headquarters there and the Mission Systems Sector has many employees that make up this total.

#### **Electronic Systems Sector (NGES)**

- ➤ BALTIMORE, MD NGES, in conjunction with the Office of Naval Research, has successfully demonstrated the ability to extend communications range and capability using the Killer Bee tactical unmanned aerial vehicle (TUAV) built by Swift Engineering, Inc During the demonstration, geographically-separated, mobile ground units were tasked to communicate with each other and also with a fixed, tactical command post using CenGen Inc.'s secure wireless, local area network. The units successfully made contact with the command post after their signals were relayed mid-air through the Killer Bee.
- ➤ BALTIMORE, MD NGES has been awarded a contract to integrate its AN/APN-241 low-power color weather and navigation radar on the C-130 aircraft for the Republic of Singapore Air Force (RSAF). The AN/APN-241 radar offers high-resolution ground mapping that enables accurate low-level navigation and precision aerial drops, predictive windshear detection in all weather conditions, and situational awareness for all-weather formation flying. Orbital Express is a DARPA program with the objective of demonstrating various technologies required for autonomous servicing of orbiting satellites. 

and operational support of the fluid transfer systems for the servicing spacecraft, named Autonomous Space Transfer and Robotic Orbiter (ASTRO), and the surrogate-client spacecraft, called the Next-Generation Satellite (NextSat). The company also provided the propulsion system needed for six-degree-of-freedom (6-DOF) service vehicle.

➤ REDONDO BEACH, CA A team of experts assembled by NASA have declared that the ten new technologies developed for NASA's James Webb Space Telescope (JWST) are mature enough to move into the detailed engineering phase. These technologies are near infrared detectors, sunshield materials, mid-infrared detectors, lightweight cryogenic mirrors, micro-shutter arrays, cryogenic detector readout, cryogenic heat switches, large precision cryogenic structures, wavefront sensing and control, and cryocoolers.

#### **Mission Systems Sector (NGMS)**

▶ PALMDALE, CA — NGMS's Airborne Signals Intelligence Payload (ASIP), a next generation signals intelligence sensor for the U.S. Air Force, has successfully completed the engineering checkout and calibration testing phase of the ASIP U-2 flight test program and has successfully embarked on the performance testing phase. The ASIP sensor is scheduled to complete flight test on the U-2 in the first quarter of 2008 with operational fielding expected in late 2008. The Global Hawk variant of the ASIP sensor is expected to complete flight testing in 2008 and begin production in 2009 with operational fielding in 2012.

#### **HELP FOR SENIORS**

E-Mail Safety — Submitted by Bobbie Love Do you really know how to forward e-mails? 50% of us do, 50% DO NOT.

Every time you forward an e-mail, there is information left over from the people who got the message before you — their e-mail addresses and names. As the messages get forwarded along, the list builds and builds and builds, and all it takes is for one of the addressees to get a virus and that infected computer can send the virus to every e-mail address that has come across his computer. Or, someone can take all of those addresses and sell them, or send junk mail to them in the hopes that you will go to the site and that person will make five cents for each hit.

How do you stop this source of spam and virus distribution? There are several easy steps:

- 1. When you forward an e-mail, DELETE all of the other addresses that appear in the body of the message (at the top). You MUST click the "Forward" button first and then you will have full editing capabilities against the body and headers of the message. Highlight them and delete them.
- 2. Whenever you send an e-mail to more than one person, do NOT use the "To" or "Cc" fields for adding e-mail addresses. Always use the "Bcc" (blind carbon copy) field for listing the e-mail addresses. This way the people you send to will only see their own e-mail address. If you don't see your "Bcc," option click on "Cc" and the "Bcc) line will appear. When you send to "Bcc" your message will automatically say "Undisclosed Recipients" in the "To" field of the ones who receive it.

- 3. Remove any "FW" in the subject line. You can rename the subject or even fix spelling.
- 4. How about those e-mails you receive that have multitude of Forwards before you can finally read the message. If you want to forward the real message, always forward from the first sender, not the last one that sent it to you. By doing this, it eliminates superfulous info the spammers would love to get.
- 5. Have you ever gotten an e-mail that is a petition? It states a position, asks you to add your name and address and then requests that you forward it to ten or 15 people or your entire address book. As it is forwarded on and on it can collect thousands of names and e-mail addresses.

FACT: That petition is worth a couple of bucks to a professional spammer because of the wealth of valid names and e-mail addresses on it. If you want to support the intent of the petition, send it as your own personal letter to the most effective source.

- 6. One of the e-mails I hate is the one that says something like, "Send this e-mail to ten people and you'll see something cute run across your screen," or sometimes they just tease you by saying something really good will happen soon. IT AIN'T GONNA!!!!!
- 7. Before you forward an Amber Alert or a Virus Alert, or some of the other ones floating around nowadays, check them out. Most of them are junk mail that have been circling the Net for YEARS!
