

HAPPENINGS AT NORTHROP GRUMMAN Reported by Frank Warren

Northrop Grumman Corporation (NG)

- ► LOS ANGELES Cogent Systems and NG announced that they have reached an agreement to settle Cogent's lawsuit against NG regarding Cogent's automated fingerprint identification technology. The agreement is subject to negotiation and execution of definitive documents. Under the terms of the agreement, NG has agreed to pay Cogent \$25 million to settle the litigation. NG also has agreed to pay Cogent \$15 million for a non-exclusive license to use specified Cogent state-of-the-art automated fingerprint identification software. Cogent and NG also have agreed to enter into a five-year research and development, service and products agreement, under which NG will pay Cogent \$20 million for products and services over the term of the agreement.
- LONDON NG's Europe-based subsidiary, Park Air Systems, will provide a comprehensive air traffic control (ATC) system to Hawler International Airport, in Erbil, Iraq, under Turkish prime contractor Mak-Yol, Inc. The \$3.2 million contract will include communication, navigation and meteorological systems.

Integrated Systems Sector (NGIS)

- MISSISSIPPI A cooperative effort between the U.S. Navy, U.S. Army, U.S. Marine Corps and NG resulted in the first ever transport of a Navy MQ-8B Fire Scout Vertical Take-off and Landing Tactical Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (VTUAV) in a Marine Corps KC-130T aircraft, flown by Marine Aerial Refueler Transport Squadron 234, Naval Air Station-Joint Reserve Base Fort Worth, Texas.
- WASHINGTON—NGIS has successfully completed a program of simulations, demonstrations and tests designed to provide the Broad Area Maritime Surveillance (BAMS) program with low programmatic and technical risk. Their BAMS Head Start Program successfully completed four system-level integration and development initiatives, which included: integrated mission system testing; full system simulation as hosted on a prototype mission control system and aircraft simulator; airframe modifications and testing; and initiating air vehicle long lead procurements and capital investments. Changes to the RQ-4B Global Hawk for the Navy included modifications to a leading edge section of the wing, which has undergone hail, bird strike and icing/de-icing tests, as well as radome modifications. The baseline BAMS design modifications met all test objectives.

Northrop Grumman Information Technology Sector (NGIT)

MCLEAN, VA—NGIT has signed a U.S. Department of Defense Mentor-Protege agreement with the U.S. Defense Contract Management Agency to provide hands-on guidance and development assistance to Cirrus Technology, Inc. Cirrus Technology, Inc., which is a small disadvantaged, service-disabled veteran-owned firm that specializes in technical and engineering services, business operations, information technology, program and installation support, and logistics engineering and analysis. The Mentor-Protege program was created to help small and disadvantaged businesses compete more successfully for military contracts by establishing relationships with large defense contractors. Under this two-year agreement, NGIT will provide technology transfer, business development and infrastructure assistance to Cirrus.

Bob Crowe Retires as Associate Editor of the NNG.

Bob Crowe, first editor of the NNG, has announced his resignation from the NNG staff, citing his many long years of pounding the keyboard as "enough!"

Bob is a native Iowan, served in the Navy for a four year hitch during the Korean War, where he served as a hospital corpsman, 28 months overseas on the USS Haven Hospital Ship. Back in California, he obtained his Journalism Degree from San Jose State University, and then was off to Escanaba, Michigan, as a cub reporter on the Escanaba Daily Press. (Escanaba is on Michigan's Upper peninsula, at the northern end of Lake Michigan.) "Too cold, plus by-lines couldn't buy very much," so he hired into STL in March 1960 as an editor in Employee Communication. Bob was a Personnel Manager from 1966 until his retirement in 1987. While a Personnel Manager he had responsibility for and periodically visited overseas employees in Australia and Europe.

Upon his retirement, Bob was a founder and first president of TRA. He is happily married to Susan, also a Space Park retiree. Bob's contributions to TRA consisted both of his talented prose as well his advice. Hopefully, he will be available to TRA as an advisor. His editorial skills will be sorely missed.

I will assume the duties of writing the Mail Pouch column, trying to maintain the very pleasant and fun style Bob created.

TRA Forum Series

Dr. Bob Brodsky will give a presentation entitled **On The Cutting Edge, Engineering Adventures In The** `60s in the E2 Presentation Room at Space Park on Thursday, November 15.The program will start at 2:45 p.m. TRA member Bob Brodsky retired from TRW in 1988, after an amazing career in aerospace that began at the Sandia Corporation, continued with Aerojet-General, and finally, TRW. He also was head of Aerospace Engineering at Iowa State University, and Adjunct Professor Aerospace Engineering at USC.

The advent of exploitation of our new prowess in space flight opened up both the imaginative minds of the pioneers and the coffers of a government embarking on cold war one-upmanship with the USSR. No company took better advantage of this environment than Aerojet-General and its newly-founded subsidiary, Space-General. Here Brodsky got a first hand immersion in the beginnings of space. He has just written a book, "On the Cutting Edge" which covers highlights of his career from the late '40s to the present. His presentation will discuss some unusual projects undertaken in the 1960's. They will include: bidding on the Saturn S-2 Stage; building the OV-3, an early Air Force satellite; the inflatable reentry paragliders, IMP and FIRST; the Surveyor 'Moon Walker'; and an early experiment in sea launch of the Aerobee sounding rocket.

Mark your calendars for Thursday, November 15, 2:45 p.m. to hear this informative presentation of those exciting early years of space exploration.

TRW Retirees Win An Emmy

On Saturday September 8, 2007, at the Shrine Auditorium, the Television Academy of Arts and Sciences presented a 2007 Emmy Certificate of Engineering Achievement Award for a "Historic contribution to television technology in the development of the Varicap Voltage Variable Capacitor." Named in the award were Howard Sachar, Simon Ramo, Sanford Barnes and William Southworth. The award was accepted by Howard Sachar.

The Varicap was developed by Pacific Semiconductors, a subsidiary of the Ramo Wooldridge Corporation. It was the first solid state electronic tuning device and was used for electronic, non-mechanical circuit tuning. The Varicap was announced in September 1957. It was patented by Pacific Semiconductors, Inc. (PSI) and later trademarked by TRW Semiconductors, the successor of PSI.

The Varicap completely replaced the television mechanical tuner by 1980. It made possible the simple remote control we use today to randomly select TV channels compared to the unreliable sequential mechanical device previously in use. The Varicap is now used in many types of electronic systems from radio to Radar and in applications all over the world.
