Robotics Demo to Be in Technical Information Center

HAPPENINGS AT NORTHROP GRUMMAN

NORTHROP GRUMMAN (NG)

- NG's first quarter 2004 income rose 31% to \$228 million, or \$1.25 per diluted share, compared with \$174 million, or \$0.91 per diluted share, for the same period of 2003.
- On May 12, 2004, NG announced that its Board of Directors approved a 15 percent increase of the common stock quarterly dividend to \$0.46 per share. The Board also declared a two-for-one split of the company's common stock to be distributed in the form of a stock dividend. The quarterly cash dividend of \$0.46 per share, up from \$0.40 per share on a pre-split basis, will be payable June 5, 2004, to shareholders of record as of the close of business May 24, 2004.
- NG's Newport News Sector successfully redelivered the nation's newest and most advanced nuclear-powered aircraft carrier, USS Ronald Reagan (CVN76), to the U.S. Navy after a post shakedown availability (PSA). The PSA allows the Navy and Newport News team to resolve any items that came up during early cruises and make any last-minute changes and upgrades.
- In April, NG opened its new Oklahoma City facility. The facility consolidates NG personnel and work activities that previously operated at several company sites throughout Oklahoma City. The five NG operating sectors in the area are Information Technology, Integrated Systems, Space Technology, Electronic Systems, and Mission Systems.
- MG Electronic Systems Sector announced its solution to the mission suite for the Aerial Common Sensor (ACS), the U.S. Army's and Navy's next-generation airborne intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance (ISR) system. By using a modular, service-oriented approach, the NG Team's ACS solution will reduce program risk and total ownership cost.

NG has developed new communication capabilities that could deliver near real-time mission and survivability information from off-board sensors to EA-6B Prowler crews. This critical information is currently not available to the crews in this format or with this precision and speed.

SPACE TECHNOLOGY (NGST)

- Space Technology first quarter 2004 sales rose 24 percent over first quarter 2003 results.
- A team led by NG received a contract to develop the first phase of the Space Based Radar (SBR) program, designed to provide integrated, global, persistent intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (ISR), as well as real-time support, to U.S. military and intelligence community operations. NGST will aid in the development of ground-segment, user-segment, and operations and support elements. Wes Bush, president of NGST said, "Our SBR team has the right people, the vision, and the best mix of industrial capabilities to build and deploy a system that is affordable, sustainable, and extraordinarily useful to an extremely wide variety of users."
- NGST has completed on schedule the payload critical design review (CDR), a major program accomplishment for the Department of Defense's nextgeneration Advanced Extremely High Frequency (EHF)communications satellite system. NGST will deliver the Advanced EHF payloads to the system prime contractor, Lockheed Martin Space Systems, Sunnyvale,
- A NGST-built High-Energy Laser destroyed a large-caliber rocket in a history-making test, showing the U.S. Army's Mobile Tactical High Energy Laser (MTHEL) potential versatility against the increasing range of battlefield threats. NGST and NGMS were involved in test bed development.

MISSION SYSTEMS (NGMS)

- NGMS first quarter 2004 sales increased 28 percent and first quarter 2004 operating margin rose 36 percent, as compared with first quarter 2003 results.
- NGMS recently signed a contract with the Ministry of National Defense of Romania to provide a wide range of services and projects supporting Romanian national defense efforts.
