HAPPENINGS AT NORTHROP GRUMMAN Reported by Andrew W. Bairden

NORTHROP GRUMMAN

► EL SEGUNDO, CA — NG has created an organization dedicated to developing and executing the company's growing list of space exploration opportunities with NASA. The new Space Exploration Systems organization will reside in the Integrated Systems (NGIS) sector and will report directly to Scott Seymour, president of the Integrated Systems. Art Stephenson, a former director of NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center, has been appointed sector vice president of Space Exploration Systems to lead the new organization. He comes to NGIS from NGST, where he served as sector vice president of Directed Energy Systems.

▶ NG has formed a new sector — Northrop Grumman Technical Services. The following four businesses become part of the new sector: Technical Services Corporation (ES), Field Support Services, Inc. (IS), Technical Services Inc. (IT), and Enterprise Management Services (MS). The sector will be headquartered in the Washington, D.C., area and the realignment will ultimately involve approximately 10,000 employees. Karin Flanagan, vice president, Strategy and Technology for Mission Systems and Information Technology sectors, will lead the transition activities.

MCLEAN, VA, — The Information Technology Sector of NG has been awarded a blanket purchase agreement valued at up to \$153 million over five years for the installation, engineering and maintenance of the U.S. Social Security Administration's local area network. The network is critical to providing availability and security to Social Security customers. e began 2005 responding to the needs of people half way around the world who were devastated by a tsunami, and wound up responding to needs much closer to home and to our company, itself, with Hurricane Katrina. We can all be proud of our company's actions on behalf of impacted employees in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, and we also greatly appreciate the tremendous personal outpouring of support from employees that continues today. In particular, the actions on the part of each of our sectors, the corporate office and individual employees showed that we truly are One Northrop Grumman.

January, 2006

Northrop Grumman remained focused throughout 2005 on delivering value to our shareholders through solid financial and program performance. We continue to demonstrate our ability to increase sales, operating margin and cash across our businesses.

We achieved a number of program milestones across the company in 2005. Among them, we delivered the first center fuselage for the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter. The Global Hawk unmanned air vehicle has logged 5,000 combat hours in support of the global war on terror, and an even more capable version is now in production. We redelivered the USS Dwight D. Eisenhower following refueling and complex overhaul, and launched the USS Texas—our first submarine launch in nearly a decade. We delivered the USS San Antonio, first in the LPD 17 class of next generation amphibious ships. We flight-tested our Counter Man-Portable Air Defense

A key component of our company's success is superior leadership. We elected four new sector presidents and two corporate senior executives in 2005—all from within the company. New sector presidents are Jim Pitts, Electronic Systems; Jerry Agee, Mission Systems; Phil Teel, Ship Systems; and Alexis Livanos, Space Technology. Wes Bush, formerly president of Space Technology, was elected Northrop Grumman's chief financial officer, and Ian Ziskin was elected chief human resources and administrative officer effective January 1, 2006. We will announce the president of our new Technical Services sector in January.

MISSION SYSTEMS (NGMS)

- OMAHA, NE Nebraska's largest defense contractor, NGMS, opened a new 110,000 square-foot facility, located near Offutt Air Force Base. The new three-story state-of-the art facility, which houses approximately 400 employees, marks the consolidation of Northrop Grumman's four local sites into one single headquarters. With a total of 750 local employees spread between the new facility and the base, the company's business in Nebraska has expanded to include systems development contracts throughout the U.S. Department of Defense and the intelligence community.
- RESTON, VA NGMS has received a delivery order to provide integrated security solutions to U.S. Marine Corps bases in Southwest Asia. Under this three-year delivery order, initially valued at nearly \$8 million, NG will survey sites, install systems and provide support services to help protect military personnel in the Marine Corps Central Command (MARCENT) area of responsibility, which includes Iraq, Djibouti, and Kuwait. Northrop Grumman is teamed with Honeywell Technology Solutions Inc.
- ➤ SUFFOLK, VA NGMS has selected a core team of partner companies for its bid to continue providing exercise and event support to the U.S. Joint Forces Command's Joint Warfighting Center (JWFC). Under the \$250 million, five-year contract, the selected contractor will support the JWFC by planning and executing joint exercises and events; conducting crisis rehearsals; coordinating joint modeling and simulation; and developing and assessing training capabilities. The contract is expected to be awarded late next year.
- HUNTSVILLE, AL NGMS's battle management software and launch control equipment, developed for the U.S. Missile Defense Agency's ground-based midcourse defense system, successfully performed during Flight Test 1. These systems play a vital role in launching the ground-based interceptor and orchestrating the overall engagement sequence. Flight Test 1 involved launching a ground-based interceptor from the Reagan Test Site on the Kwajalein Atoll, against a simulated target missile threat.
- SAN DIEGO, CA NGMS and the U.S. Air Force successfully completed flight testing of the Battlefield Airborne Communications Node, a significant milestone toward providing warfighters an advanced way to share critical information by communicating over airborne networks at high altitudes. The team is led by NGMS and includes the Space Technology, Integrated Systems, and Information Technology sectors. This is a prime example of NG President Ron Sugar's emphasis on "One Northrop Grumman."

SPACE TECHNOLOGY SECTOR (NGST)

REDONDO BEACH, CA — A high-energy, solid-state laser developed by NGST for the U.S. military has fired one of the most powerful beams yet produced by an electric laser of more than 27 kW with a run time of 350 seconds. In a separate test, the laser demonstrated excellent beam quality at 19 kW.
