HAPPENINGS AT NORTHROP GRUMMAN

Northrop Grumman Corp. (NG)

- LOS ANGELES — NG reported fourth quarter 2009 net earnings of \$413 million, or \$1.31 per diluted share, and 2009 net earnings of \$1.7 billion, or \$5.21 per diluted share. In 2008, the company reported a fourth quarter net loss of \$2.5 billion, or \$7.75 per diluted share, and a net loss for the year of \$1.3 billion, or \$3.77 per diluted share. 2008 fourth quarter and full year results were significantly impacted by a goodwill impairment charge. Cash provided by operations in the fourth quarter of 2009 totaled \$931 million compared with \$1 billion in the fourth quarter of 2008. Cash provided by operations totaled \$2.1 billion in

2009 compared with \$3.2 billion in 2008. The change was primarily driven by a \$538 million increase in pension plan contributions and \$508 million in taxes paid in the fourth quarter of 2009 on the gain on the sale of TASC. Cash proceeds of \$1.65 billion from the sale of TASC are reported in investing activities.

- LOS ANGELES, Several NG sites have been honored by the California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery as Waste Reduction Awards Program (WRAP) winners. Established in 1993 by the California Integrated Waste Management Board, WRAP annually recognizes those California businesses that have made outstanding efforts to reduce the volume of paper, cardboard and other recyclable waste products that otherwise might end up in local landfills. For the fourth consecutive year, NG's Navigation Systems Division in Woodland Hills was cited for its comprehensive waste reduction and recycling activities. NGAS's sites in El Segundo and Palmdale each won the WRAP award for the 12th consecutive year. The NG Defense Systems Division was cited for its comprehensive waste reduction and recycling activities including diverting nine tons of waste in 2008 at its 20-acre Carson facility. The Carson facility has been recognized for its WRAP efforts since 1998.

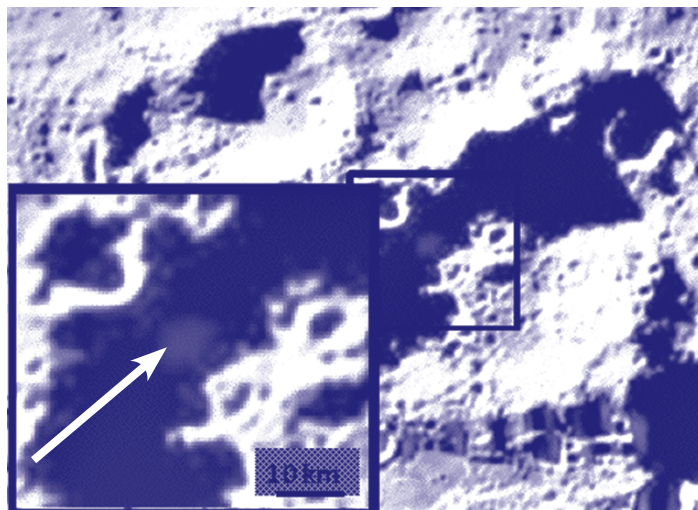

LCROSS Moon Impact Results Outstanding

There's water on the moon! NASA scientists have been busy analyzing the huge amount of data that the Space Park-built LCROSS satellite beamed back to earth. Scientists have long speculated that the polar regions of the moon might harbor ice crystals. Now they have the data to prove it.

LCROSS was launched on June 18, 2009 atop an Atlas Centaur launch vehicle. The satellite held on to the spent Centaur upper stage. After 113 days, and as they approached an impact at the moon's south pole, the LCROSS separated from the Centaur. The Centaur impact created a crater on the moon, sending debris flying. Spectators on the earth were disappointed; the debris field was not visible to them. The LCROSS had about four minutes to send back data from the impact before it, too, crashed into the moon. It is the data from those four minutes that have the scientists so enthused.

The debris field plume was in two parts. The first part was a high angle plume of vapor and fine dust. The second part was a lower angle and consisted of heavier material. Anthony Colaprete, the NASA principal investigator on the project, said, "Multiple lines of evidence show water was present in both the high angle vapor plume and the ejecta curtain created by the . . . impact." The analysis of the data continues.

HAPPENINGS*Continued from Page 1***Aerospace Systems Sector (NGAS)**

- REDONDO BEACH, CA — NGAS has been selected by ITT Corporation to provide flight cryocoolers for the sensor payloads for two international weather satellites. The geostationary satellites will provide round-the-clock weather forecasts and severe weather alerts. Cryocoolers are used to reduce thermal noise in space-based sensors. The NGAS cooler design is based on the flight-proven High Efficiency Cryocooler (HEC) pulse tube cooler and will maintain the international satellites' infrared detectors and optics at cryogenic temperatures for more than 8 years. This improved imager has the capability to monitor three times the number of atmospheric events when compared to current generation payloads. This contract marks the third time a NGAS cryocooler will have supported an international weather/climate satellite.
- REDONDO BEACH, CA — The five-layer, tennis court-sized sunshield for the NGAS built James Webb Space Telescope has passed its critical design review, certifying that its design is complete and meets mission requirements. By achieving thermal, deployment and stray-light targets, the sunshield is now ready for manufacturing. A behind the scenes look at the Webb Telescope is available at: http://webbtelescope.org/webb_telescope/behind_the_webb. The Webb telescope's sunshield is a five-layer structure the size of a tennis court. Each of the five membrane layers is about as thick as a human hair (one to two-thousands of an inch thick) and is made of a polymer-based film called Kapton.

Electronic Systems Sector (NGES)

- WEST BALTIMORE, MD — During a dedication ceremony and open house held on Jan. 23, James F. Pitts, corporate vice president and president of Northrop Grumman's Electronic Systems sector, presented Smith and her family the keys to their new home, while thanking the 130 Northrop Grumman employees, family members and friends who volunteered more than 1,600 hours over a nine month period toward accomplishing the extensive home renovation effort. Under the guidance of Sandtown Habitat for Humanity representatives, the NGES employee volunteers, families and friends worked on a variety of construction activities including wood framing, roofing, drywall, flooring and painting, among other tasks.

Information Systems Sector (NGIS)

- HUNTSVILLE, AL — NGIS has won a \$577 million U.S. Army contract to develop the Integrated Air and Missile Defense Battle Command System (IBCS). The five-year contract is a cost-plus-fixed-fee contract for system design and development. IBCS is an integrated air and missile-defense command and control capability. Enabled by a battlefield fire control network, the system will provide the technology, tools and information needed to make better decisions on the battlefield. NGIS will develop the system in collaboration with fellow defense companies, which include Boeing Co., Lockheed Martin Corp., and Harris Corp. NGIS's Integrated Air and Missile Defense Project Office in Huntsville, Alabama, will manage the IBCS program. NGIS will also locate its IBCS program in Huntsville. IBCS is expected to be operational by 2014. Systems that would be integrated via IBCS include Patriot, Surface-Launched Advanced Medium Range Air-to-Air Missile (SLAMRAAM), Joint Land Attack Cruise Missile Defense Elevated Netted Sensor (JLENS), and Improved Sentinel radar.

Summarized from the National Academy of Engineering (NAE) 2010 Memoriam Volume for deceased NAE members

DR. GEORGE E. SOLOMON 1925-2005

George Solomon graduated from high school in Ballard Washington in 1942, and started attending the University of Washington. World War II interrupted his education plans when he volunteered at age 18 for the US Army. He was severely wounded in 1945 during the "Battle of the Bulge" after volunteering to carry ammunition forward through heavy mortar fire to front line infantry troops. Those injuries resulted in loss of his right leg. For this heroic action he was awarded the Bronze Star, along with the Purple Heart.

After nearly a year of recovery and therapy in army hospitals, George returned to the University of Washington and earned a B. S. degree with honors in Aeronautical Engineering in 1949. He was accepted at the California Institute of Technology (CIT), where he studied under the legendary CIT aeronautics professor Hans Liepman, and received his PhD Magna Cum Laude in 1952.

In 1954, Cal Tech PhDs Simon Ramo (1936) and Dean Wooldrige (1936), won a contract for ballistic missile "Systems Engineering and Technical Direction" from the Air Force, and established a Guided Missile Research Division (GMRD) in Ramo-Wooldrige Inc. Dr. Ramo offered the new fellow Cal Tech PhD a job to focus his expertise on the problems of aerodynamic stability and thermal protection during nose-cone reentry. During the period 1954 to 1957, as Director of Systems Research and Analysis in GMRD, George had responsibility for the reentry vehicle of Atlas; the Nation's first ICBM. The Atlas was crucial to the USA's defensive position versus the aggressive and belligerent Soviet Union during what became the start of the 40 year cold war.

In 1957, GMRD was reorganized as the Space Technology Laboratories (STL) and George was appointed Director of STL's Aeromechanics Laboratory (AL). The technologies evolved for Atlas were exploited in the Thor, Titan and Minuteman missiles, all of which were systems engineered by STL. In addition, the AL carried out the systems engineering of several of the USA's earliest successful scientific spacecraft including Able IV and V, the NASA's interplanetary Pioneers, the Orbiting Geophysical Observatory (OGO), and the system design of the first USA satellites to monitor for nuclear explosions (VELA). In January 1959, Dr Solomon hired me from Cal Tech's Jet Propulsion Laboratory. For the next twenty eight years, until George's retirement from TRW in 1987, it was my privilege to carry out my career in organizations under the management of this brilliant scientist and engineer. George was much more than a manager; he was a leader of the highest integrity, a gentle man who provided encouragement, support and friendship to those who worked with him.

George's 25 years of accomplishments for TRW, and his engineering stature in both the USA and internationally was recognized by TRW's Board of Directors in 1981 when they appointed him as a corporate Executive Vice President, and made him General Manager of a new Electronics and Defense Sector of TRW (E&D). This major business Sector employed almost 40,000 scientists, engineers, technical support and business management personnel in eight operating groups, with laboratories, manufacturing facilities, engineering test sites and offices throughout the world. The large family of scientific spacecraft systems and the many military communications and surveillance satellites produced by E&D were, and continue to be, of crucial importance to our Nation's defense.

Dr. Solomon was honored by election as a Fellow of both the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics (AIAA) and the American Astronautical Society (AAS), and as a member of the National Academy of Engineering (1967). He received a University of Washington Distinguished Alumni Award in 1984, and also was honored by receiving a Distinguished Alumni award from the California Institute of Technology in 1983.

George married his second wife Karen in 1985. Following his retirement in 1987, they moved to the Santa Barbara suburb of Montecito, California. He and his wife joined the Greek Orthodox Church of Santa Barbara, and as one could have predicted, he became the president of the parish council. In 1995 he and Karen moved to Boise, Idaho where he lived the remaining years of his exceptional life. George passed away on April 25, 2005.

Dr. George E. Solomon should be eulogized by recognition that from the time he left a leg at the Battle of the Bulge in World War II; through thirty years of developing major missile and spacecraft systems critical to the defense of this nation; and additional years of aiding his fellow handicapped veterans and underprivileged citizens, his life was dedicated to the service and protection of his country. He certainly deserves to be remembered as a premiere example of what has come to be designated in the United States as "The Greatest Generation."
