HAPPENINGS AT NORTHROP GRUMMAN

Northrop Grumman Corp. (NG)

 LOS ANGELES — In a blow to Southern California, Northrop Grumman Corporation said it would relocate its corporate staff from Los Angeles to the Washington,



D.C., area by summer 2011 to be closer to its key customer, the U.S. government. This move leaves the region that gave birth to the aerospace industry without a single major military contractor based here. Maryland, Virginia and the District are all vying to host NG. The new location is expected to be announced in April of this year. The new

corporate office will include about 300 people. Although the company is moving the corporate staff, California remains a significant location for Northrop's research, development and manufacturing, the company said, noting that it still will have about 30,000 employees, a quarter of Northrop's worldwide employment, working in the state.

LOS ANGELES — NG chairman emeritus Ronald D. Sugar has received the prestigious Laureate Award from Aviation Week and Space Technology magazine, the aerospace industry's premier news publication. The award was bestowed at a black-tie event March 17, 2010 at the Andrew Mellon Auditorium in Washington, D.C. Laureate awards recognize individuals and teams for their extraordinary accomplishments that embody the spirit of exploration, innovation and vision. Sugar was named the first Workforce Laureate, a newly created category. He was honored for his actions in support of attracting young people to aerospace careers, developing young professionals, and retaining the talent needed for a healthy, vibrant aerospace industry. Aviation Week and Space Technology cited his work addressing critical workforce issues in four fundamental ways: creation

The NNG continues Memories: It's Hard to Forget with a memory from Sandy Friedfeld. What unusual or surprising event happened during your career at TRW/NG that other retirees might enjoy? With the 40th anniversary of the Apollo 13 flight coming up in April, I can still remember watching the launch in person. TRW sent me to Florida to "monitor" the Lunar Module Decent Engine (LMDE)/lander interface. Sitting on the barge which brought up the large propellant tanks, I was about a quarter of a mile closer than the VIP's sitting in the grandstands. What a beautiful launch. Then those famous words, "Houston, we have a problem."

My 3 day planned sight-seeing trip was quickly brought to a halt as I came right back to Space Park and became part of the team working to see if the LMDE could be used to get the astronauts home. Could it survive the requirements to fire and get them around the moon and head for earth?

The rest is history. The astronauts then came to Space Park to thank TRW for our effort in getting them bome. When a question was asked of them if they had any concerns, their answer was, "Yes, that TRW was the low bidder."

The Western Museum of Flight (WMOF), located at the Torrance airport is a continuation of the Northrop Grumman museum previously located at the Hawthorne airport. This activity is being led by some of our fellow retirees and is in need of some assistance. The museum is dedicated to capturing and displaying the achievements of the Southern California aerospace industry and has a relatively extensive collection of aircraft, aircraft history and flying memorabilia. A group of volunteers, led by Dale Hoffman, Mac Morrison, Herc Smith and Mort Sogaard, have undertaken the task of developing a display that will include coverage of the spaceflight segment of the industry.

of cooperative work spaces and incorporation of new technologies and tools enhancing communication and teaming to align with changing workforce demographics; capture and retention of company knowledge and expertise; preservation of professional development and learning in one of the most difficult business climates; and employee transitions.

Aerospace Systems Sector (NGAS)

▶ EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, CA. — NGAS technicians here have begun installing the first set of hardware for a B-2 stealth bomber upgrade that will eventually allow the jet to send and receive battlefield information up to 100 times faster than its current satellite communications system. The work is being done as part of Increment 1 of the U.S. Air Force's B-2 extremely high frequency (EHF) satellite communications program. NGAS is the Air Force's prime contractor for the B-2 Spirit, the flagship of the nation's long range strike arsenal, and one of the world's most survivable aircraft systems. The B-2 is the only combat-proven stealth platform in the current U.S. inventory.

Electronic Systems Sector (NGES)

APOPKA, FL — NGES has received a delivery order award from the U.S. Army valued at \$142.7M to provide over 500 Lightweight Laser Designator Rangefinders (LLDR) under a five-year indefinite delivery/indefinite quantity contract.

Information Systems Sector (NGIS)

▶ RESTON, VA — NGIS has successfully installed a demonstration Real-Time Electronic Flight Data System (REFS) for the U.S. Air Force that will create a more efficient flight information system for air traffic controllers. REFS is a Terminal Flight Data Management (TFDM) system comprising several modules including the electronic flight strip module that automates the production, distribution and administrative management of flight plan information and other air traffic control data. This is the first operational TFDM system installed in the U.S. at Sheppard Air Force Base, Wichita Falls, Texas. The system facilitates inter- and intra-facility coordination within and between the FAA En Route Air Traffic Control Center in Fort Worth, Texas, and various facilities at Sheppard Air Force Base including radar approach, control, air traffic control tower, base operations and emergency response services. The FAA certified REFS for operation in the National Airspace System on June 24, 2009. The Air Force is currently testing and validating the technology as an alternative to the paper-based system.

SAN DIEGO — The U.S. Navy has selected NGIS for the development phase of the U.S. Navy's Consolidated Afloat Networks and Enterprise Services (CANES) program. CANES will streamline and update shipboard network systems to improve interoperability and affordability across the fleet. A team led by NGIS received a \$17.4 million indefinite-delivery/indefinitequantity, cost-plus-incentive-fee, cost-plus-fixed-fee and firm-fixed-price contract, one of two CANES Common Computing Environment system development contracts awarded by the Program Executive Office C4I, Tactical Networks Program Manager (PMW-160) in San Diego on March 4, 2010. Work under the contract is expected to be complete in April 2011. If all options are exercised, the contract will include system production through September 2014 and be valued at \$775 million.

Abner Kaplan 1923 — 2010

Abner was born in New York City June 21, 1923, the son of George and Hannah Kaplan. His father worked in the family milk business. Growing up, he developed a passion for flying model airplanes and attending air shows, which laid the foundation for his eventual studies in Aeronautical Engineering. He also grew up as a New York Giants baseball fan.

Abner chose Cal Tech for college. His education there was interrupted by WWII when he joined the Army. Because of his eyesight he was not eligible for Officer Training School and became a sergeant in the 1263rd Engineering Combat Battalion. It was the duty of this battalion to keep the roads passable and install Bailey Bridges across the rivers. He had one note worthy adventure fighting the Germans. He was riding in a truck in the woods in Germany and was with a group of army cooks. All were busy cleaning their rifles when one of the rifles discharged. A group of German soldiers suddenly appeared out of the woods with their hands up. Abner and the cooks had prisoners! After the war Abner returned to Cal Tech and received his BS and, in 1949, his Master's Degree. While at Cal Tech, Abner met Marie Ellen Henschel and they married in September of 1950. He received his PhD in Aeronautical Engineering in 1954.

Abner's first job after college was at Northrop Aircraft, Inc. in Inglewood. One year later he was offered an engineering position in the Aeromechanics Group of the Guided Missile Research Division as one of the first (Badge No. 213) employees of Ramo Wooldridge Corp, which later became TRW.

He was a Life Member of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, and was an active participant in the Applied Mechanics Division of that group.

After the Dodgers moved to Los Angeles in 1958, Abner became a fan and annually attended games with his children.

Abner retired from TRW in January, 1992, after 37 years with the company. During his retirement years he and Marie traveled to Canada, the Galapagos Islands, France, and Alaska.

He has been an active volunteer with the TRA, working arduously with the group of retirees that maintain the TRW and Northrop Grumman Archives.

The Kaplans had three children, Eric, Ellen, and Michael.

Abner had a fall on March 31, resulting in a broken femur. He survived the surgery, but died on April 2, 2010. Abner is survived by his wife, Marie, and three children, his brother, Jerry, his sister, Meta and his three grandchildren, Sean Julius Dreusike, 28, Wesley Michael Dreusike, 25, and Jason Abner Kaplan, 7.
