The College of Engineering at California State University, Los Angeles, conducts a Professional Practice Program that partners industry with students. The capstone course, referred to as Senior Design, is an academic year-long course with an aim to enhance the recruitment, retention, and graduation of

high potential engineering students that enter the professional workforce. Industry sponsors provide real problems, funding, and seasoned liaisons for each project. The student teams are also partnered with a faculty member or a professional volunteer to help guide their engineering practice. Most years, there are approximately 100 Electrical and Mechanical Engineering students in the course that are working on 25 projects. TRW/Northrop Grumman has contributed in a major way by not only underwriting the program with an ongoing endowment, but in the past three academic years, 10 retirees have participated as technical advisors. These participants included Don Baxter, Ray Manning, Bob Doll, Ted Nye, Charley Hoult, George Reppucci, Hagop Injeyan, Stepan Simonian, Reggie Jue, and Ron Sobchik.

In addition to the projects, the course conducts expert guest lectures that have been taught by the following NG employees: Ron Evans – Electromagnetic Compatibility; Sam Foroozan - Electrical Power Systems; Aaron Oki - Microelectronics; and Cecilia Penera - Thermal Design.

CSULA serves over a 90% minority population, where most attendees are the first in their families to attend college. We are looking for additional retirees to join our ranks. HAPPENINGS AT NORTHROP GRUMMAN

Aerospace Systems Sector (NGAS)

SAN DIEGO, CA —NGAS successfully demonstrated

mission management control features that create more unmanned aircraft system (UAS) versatility and efficiencies. During a series of high-altitude, long-endurance RQ-4 Global Hawk demonstrations, the UAS seamlessly responded to external requests to dynamically alter its route of flight and sensor functionality, thereby breaking the one-user to one-vehicle paradigm.

- CARPINTERIA, CA —NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory has declared the Soil Moisture Active Passive (SMAP) spacecraft fully operational, officially beginning the satellite's three-year mission to provide global measurements of soil moisture. This milestone also continues the 100 percent on-orbit success rate of Astro Aerospace, an NGAS company. SMAP's data capabilities are enabled in part by the largest spinning mesh reflector ever deployed in space, engineered by Astro Aerospace. The 6-meter reflector and boom are a critical system for SMAP, spinning at about 15 revolutions per minute to create a conically scanning antenna beam of approximately 620 miles for total global mapping every two to three days. SMAP data will improve weather and climate prediction models by increasing our understanding of the processes that link Earth's water, energy, and carbon
- WOODLAND HILLS, CA—NGAS was awarded a contract from Naval Air Systems Command to deliver its nextgeneration mission computer for Lot 12 of the Marine Corps' H-1 helicopter upgrade program. Under this contract, NG will provide FlightProT Gen III mission computers for the UH-1Y and AH-1Z aircraft.
- ► REDONDO BEACH, CA —NGAS announced an organizational realignment. Chris Hernandez has been appointed vice president of the newly formed research, technology and advanced design organization. In this role, Hernandez will integrate resources to drive basic






