Life Abroad After Retirement

Editor: As a relatively new retiree I find it fascinating what people find to do after retiring. Howard had sent TRA an e-mail describing his blog. I asked him to write this article that summarizes his experiences living part of the year in England.

I worked at TRW from 1961 to 1992 and retired as a laboratory manager/assistant program manager. I primarily worked on software for the Minuteman missile systems. After retirement I established a non-profit corporation, Start Out Smart - Read, to educate expectant and new parents on the importance of reading to their children regularly starting at birth. We have educated almost 100,000 parents and provided each a book to read aloud to their baby.

After exchanging vacation homes in England three times and enjoying the experience, we bought a cottage in England in 1998. The cottage is 80 miles north of London in a village of 750. My wife, Kat, and I stay in England 4 or 5 months of the year. I began writing about our experiences and they are now contained in a blog, "No One Goes to England for the Weather," at hbgrossman.tumblr.com.

Village life in England is a unique experience. Our village had two 17th century pubs. One has survived and serves good food at a reasonable price. Quality English food is no longer an oxymoron.

When getting the cottage ready for our residence we hired a painter and bought carpets and flooring. Each bill was about \$3,000 and when I asked if they wanted a deposit the responses were identical, "When I am done and you are satisfied with my work, pay me."

In the village biyearly dessert competition everyone gets to taste all the entries and vote for one. My blog recipe, Coconut Caramel Pecan pie, has been my only win. In the garden's club's yearly competition, my entry of a tomato pie was disqualified by a ruling that said that tomato was a vegetable (it is a fruit,) even though the judge said my pie was delicious. The following year the category changed that allowed the tomato pie, but I didn't win a ribbon even when I was the only entry.














HAPPENINGS AT NORTHROP GRUMMAN

NG Responds to GPS III Space Vehicle Alternatives Program Request for Proposal

NG has submitted a proposal to the United States Air Force for the next-generation Global Positioning System (GPS) III program. The Air Force plans to develop a new generation of GPS space vehicles that will deliver the advanced capabilities needed by military and civil users. The GPS system has been delivering precise global position, navigation and timing services worldwide for more than two decades.

NG's proposal is based on a navigational payload prototype built and tested in 2015 and a heritage space vehicle proven to operate in the harsh environment of medium earth orbit. In addition to current GPS III capabilities, the company's payload demonstrated enhanced transmission power for the military code, a critical capability for operating in regions of the world where jamming is prevalent.

The Air Force plans to award up to three \$5 million study contracts in the third quarter of 2016. A competition for 22 spacecraft is anticipated in 2018.

Company Receives Awards

NG received the Gene Washington Champion of Champion's Award, the Chairman's Award, and the Summer Engineering Experience for Kids program award at the 42nd annual National Society of Black Engineers (NSBE) conference held in Boston. Gloria Pualani, NG director of socio-economic business programs/government relations, received the Sustainability Maven award.

In addition to the awards, NSBE announced a three-year, \$2 million program funded by the NG Foundation designed to expand the nation's engineering workforce through a partnership with Historically Black Colleges and Universities. The program will provide 72 engineering students with \$8,000 scholarship grants, internships with NG and year-round academic and professional development support.

NASA Awards Instrument Contract for Joint Polar Satellite System Mission

On behalf of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), NASA has awarded a sole source contract modification to NG (of Azusa, California) for two additional Advanced Technology Microwave Sounder (ATMS) instruments for the JPSS-3 and JPSS-4 missions.

Under this contract, NG will manufacture, test and deliver the ATMS instruments, support instrument integration on the spacecraft and provide launch and post-launch support. These instruments will be designed to perform like the ATMS currently flying on the NOAA/NASA Suomi-National Polar-orbiting Partnership (NPP) mission.



The next NNG will be mailed in July.


